Rudy Giuliani dropped out of the race on January 30, 2008
Tom Tancredo dropped out of the race on December 20, 2007
Fred Thompson dropped out of the race on January 22, 2008
Romney suspends his campaign February 7, 2008

The drop outs above, according to the February 22, 2008, numbers received a whopping 192,537 votes. How can that many people vote for candidates who were no longer in the race? They can't all be "protest" votes.

Why no changes in the other districts if votes were still allegedly being recounted - not even for the "top three"? The numbers are all over the place.

District 4:

Alan Keyes and Mitt Romney lost votes while all other candidates increased across the board.

The whole state allegedly voted the same with few exceptions:

1,2,3 went to McCain, Romney, Huckabee

Reminds me of the 1996 California primary. Out of 52 seats for U.S. House of Representatives, eleven had these totals:

Not real creative. All incumbents who "won" voted for NAFTA. All the challengers were dead set against that destructive treaty. The bigger the state, the easier to cheat we the people.

Allegedly, Giuliani, a candidate no longer in the race, beat Ron Paul state wide by a margin of 8,417 votes

According to the February 22nd numbers, Ron Paul placed 4th ahead of Giuliani in 30 districts out of 53.

In District 20, non candidate, Fred Thompson, is shown beating Ron Paul by 25 votes placing him 6th in that district.
